Suicide mortality rates for people with disability in Australia

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Suicide is a leading cause of mortality

Large variation in suicide mortality between subgroups of the population

Limited evidence globally on suicide mortality for people with disability

Important given large mental health inequalities


People with severe or profound disability, defined as requiring assistance with core activities in Census 2011


Outcome


Suicide deaths from death registration data, 2011-2021 (10 years of follow up)

Analysis

Age standardised and age-specific suicide rates







Suicide rates were 2-4-times higher for people with disability compared to the general population

Reducing deaths by suicide for people with disability needs to be a public health priority

Future research needs to examine the causes to generate policy solutions to close the gap



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
